


Rate City of Dayton parks.




Rate City of Dayton events.




Rate the City of Dayton's downtown.




How would you rate safety in Dayton?









Rate City Streets


Rate the City of Dayton as a whole.



Overall, the respondents of the 2025 Resident Survey said that the City of Dayton is moving in the right direction with 66%. 7% (-2) of respondents chose "Dayton is moving in the wrong direction" in the survey, this category has seen a downward trendline over the past four years. This result should give confidence to the current administration that the majority of citizens believe Dayton is improving overall.

Fourteen percent (-1) of respondents chose that they were unsure about Dayton's trajectory. The City should continue to emphasize public relations and communication with the community in order to lower this number in future surveys.



What is needed to improve City streets?

- Less development!!!
- Repaving and better snow removal
- Enforcing no u turns on Sixth Ave
- Repaved surfaces Sidewalk/guardrail repair Litter removal
- Address potholes, have no parking zones directly next to cross streets as it creates a blind spot and/easy to clip a parked car when turning right.
- Actually have city workers examine and address every street for re[airs. then start scheduling roads for repayes. the city never repayes roads. they just let the state repaye the Avenue.
- Better drainage run off either gravel orfrench drains. Streets in neighborhoods designated parking or no parking signs. in congested areas just designate lanes and a road stripe. Safety can be unruly neighbors
- Cleanliness. Lots of trash along the roads and sidewalks in areas.
- Pot holes, other than that the streets are kept cleaned
- We are fortunate enough to have off street parking, but it is off an alleyway. It would be nice to have some improvement to the alley, including fully paving it and plowing it during the snow (understanding it's low priority).
- Pot hole repair
- Some of the streets have the same issues like sinking concrete. They do fix it but have to fix them multiple times because it keeps recurring.
- Repair to potholes and places that utility workers have dug into to make safer, have had sinkholes in these locations

- When it snows they need to salt the hill
- Seem ok compared to other cities. Confusing parking on streets, spaces and no-parking need to be better marked.
- Pot holes filled, gutters repaired and weeds growing in the street.
- I love the bumper outs and the charm it had added to the avenue. There are some rough sidewalks. I took a nighttime fall on the southwest corner of Clay and 5th. The roads themselves seem to be in good shape. Except where the trucks drive on 4th to route 8. That's gets pretty torn up. Being an entrance to the city it should definitely get some care.
- Maintenance and regulation. Many side streets and alleys (which are considered streets) are in need of repair. More importantly, the traffic and parking is uncontrolled. Traffic laws are regularly ignored (e.g., excessive speeding and running run lights and stop signs are a routine

- occurrence). Cars are regularly parked illegally (in no-park zones, blocking streets, alleys, etc). The abuse of traffic regulations causes an unsafe environment.
- A continued effort to install sidewalks and trash cans in areas without (ex. Dayton Pike, Lincoln Road, Dayton Road) to increase walkability. Maintaining curb cuts for wheelchair access along 6th Ave have been very welcome.
- Routine maintenance and follow up on utility companies when they make repairs and do shoddy work when repairing their cuts.
- Fill in pot holes in a more timely manner.
- Consistent maintenance and upkeep. Perhaps if all the residents that are able to get their vehicles registered in OH but live, drive, and park in Dayton would pay their fair share, we'd have the funds for that maintenance.

In addition, adequately painting/repainting curbs where yellow lines should be. This is especially the case on secondary streets-above/below the avenue. The Avenue gets far more attention than the others, which shouldn't be the case.
